SHAKESPEARE FESTIVAL

On Saturday, a merry band of players made their way to Waimea College for the annual festival, a highlight every year for the Drama department. Six different Garin groups performed across the day, and watched other schools, or relaxed in the green room before performing their pieces. This year, Mr Allan directed a junior group in a short ensemble piece based around a monologue by Lucien Panting as Launcelot Gobbo, from the Merchant of Venice. A group of angels and devils simulated the inner-most thoughts of the character. The piece was precise, looked striking, drew laughs from the crowd and brought the mono-logue to life very clearly. Lucien won two awards at the end of the evening, for 'Best Delivery of the Text,' and as runner-up for direct entry student to the National Secondary School Production, a huge achievement for a Year 10.





Two year 12 groups, consisting of Tegan Gibbs-Fleming, John Noble, Seth Blackburn (Taming of the Shrew) and Flurina Gauler and Sarah Carter (As You Like It) performed vocally strong and connected pieces from their class work this year. The sight of John screaming and running from the stage in full princess outfit, and losing his wig in the process, was a memorable ending.

The marquee Year 13 group of Jade Alborn, Jed Frethey, Megan Ritchie and Hamish Shelly, otherwise known as 'Art' entered three pieces between them. They were deservedly awarded 'Best Team Performance' for their quirky and irreverent piece in one of the final acts of the day, in which a bewildered Macbeth encountered a group of performance art witches. Hamish Shelly got so involved in his performance that his microphone flew into the audience as he aggressively clutched the mic stand. Jade and Hamish also did a great job of a very bawdy piece from A Comedy of Errors, and Megan and Jed took home more silverware for their chilling wartime version of an extract from Richard III. For this they were awarded 'Best History' play, 'Best Tragedy' play and for her outstanding efforts across the day, Megan Ritchie was awarded the NSSP Direct Entry award, which recognises the most outstanding performer from a group that was not selected

for a place in the National Finals, and grants her a place in the National Secondary Schools Production in November, and a chance of being selected for a trip to the Globe Theatre in London. Congratulations Megan, a fully deserved recognition for your amazing efforts in Drama in your time at Garin.

HOLY WEEK LITURGY



Today we gathered as a Garin College Community to signify the coming of Holy Week which starts next Thursday during our Term One holidays. At the beginning of our liturgy students brought forward palms to signify Palm Sunday, a cross for Jesus' ultimate sacrifice and candles to recognise the faith that grows in our community through Jesus Christ.

We celebrated the washing of the feet which will take place on Holy Thursday. This action demonstrates Christ's actions the night before he died when he showed his Disciples an example of how they are to love one another in imitation of Jesus' love for us. This has a deeper meaning for our community of Jesus' call for Garin College students to be servant leaders to others with a heart of Aroha.

We also heard the last moments of Jesus' life during his passion and death on Good Friday. We heard how Jesus was sent before the Roman Governor Pontius Pilate who gave in to the demands of the Jewish priests to execute Jesus. Jesus death and resurrection is more than just a story it is fundamental to our faith and our identity as a Catholic College.

Students were invited to write prayers to reflect on what Jesus' action mean for them in their lives. Below are some of the prayers that we read out.

I pray to you today to thank you for the sacrifice you have made for me. Thank you for your forgiveness and paying the price for my sins and giving me eternal life. Help me to walk in that mighty grace and tell your good news to the world.

Lord Jesus,


We concluded our service by following out our College cross to symbolise Jesus death and how we are called to walk behind this, as we walk with faith in Jesus Christ.

St Paul's Year 7 Technology

Computational Thinking is now considered a core thinking skills for all students yet this does not require a computer.

St Paul's Year 7 students have been developing a board game that relies upon "if....then....else" statements commonly used in programming. The game had to represent the Natureland Zoo at Tahunanui so included a path, animals and information about native and introduced species to NZ. The graphics were created using Paint.net, so students had to understand the principle of layers in the images they created and how to manipulate different types of files. However, the biggest challenge was to save and retrieve files in a networked environment.

As part of their final lesson they had to have their game evaluated by the year 13 students who were initially a little reserved, but soon became enthralled by the activity thanks to the enthusiasm and thought the Year 7's had put into their digital outcome. The project proved to be a marvellous success on all fronts as it was not only fun, but authentic, relevant and provided an appropriate level of challenge, so will be run every year. My thanks goes to all who participated but especially to the St Paul's students who were an inspiration to teach.









NCEA ONLINE

supporting digital transformation in schools

WHAT'S HAPPENING

NZQA is changing how students can do their NCEA exams – from hand-written papers, to online, using a PC or laptop. This reflects the way students already interact with the world and how they are doing much of their learning, and it helps to prepare them for their next steps after school.

Most secondary school students are learning and living in a world where technology is always at their fingertips, so it makes sense all parts of their education, including assessment, uses digital technology. That's certainly what students are telling us they want.

Using digital technologies to learn and be assessed will help schools teach the fast-evolving skills needed for life and work. For example over the next 20 years two thirds of children entering primary school today will work in job types that don't yet exist and nearly half of current jobs may disappear to automation.

We're introducing NCEA Online in stages – offering 14 subjects digitally in 2019 across levels 1, 2 and 3, with the range of subjects expanding in 2020 and beyond. From 2016, more than 22,000 students from 203 schools have participated in at least one Digital Trial or Pilot – with very positive feedback. Over the five years to 2018 around three quarters of New Zealand secondary schools and well over 30,000 students experienced some form of digital assessment.

WHERE WE'RE HEADING

Our 21st century approach to digital assessment will support innovation in teaching and learning and will change along with evolving technology.

New approaches will let students show in different ways what they know, the skills they have learned and how they can use that in real-life situations. This could include oral responses or collaborations, simulation assessments or assessments supervised remotely.

The data generated by digital assessment will help with developments in how exams are designed and approaches to teaching and learning.





HOW WE'RE INVOLVING SCHOOLS

We're involving schools, students and exam centre managers in the design process, so the way we deliver digital exams matches the changing classroom experience and works well for the students.

NCEA Online will evolve, driven by the experience of students and teachers. We're working with other education agencies to make sure all schools and students can participate in digital assessments when they are ready.

As schools gain confidence with text-based exams and as technology evolves, we'll ensure NCEA Online can deliver a good user experience for subjects where special characters are required, such as mathematics, science and music.

Because schools are at different stages regarding their approach to digital teaching and learning, digital assessment needs to be in sync with that. So we'll continue offering paper-based exams as schools transition towards digital education.

We're helping schools to prepare for digital assessment through:

- Familiarisation showing students and teachers the features of digital exams
- Previous NZQA digital assessments

 digital versions of the previous year's NCEA exams will be available for the subjects offered online
- School readiness working with school staff to assess school and student readiness for digital assessment
- Training providing exam centre managers and supervisors with the knowledge and skills to administer the assessments.

WHY IT'S IMPORTANT

Moving assessment online shows students, schools, whānau, communities and employers we are developing NCEA as a modern, innovative and world-class qualification supporting students to build the skills and knowledge they need.

Personalised learning pathways that include digital assessment have the potential to engage more students in new ways more relevant to their individual needs and their culture.

We look forward to continuing to work with learners, whānau, teachers, educators, iwi and industry so all New Zealanders can qualify for the future world.
